

THE EUCHARIST

It is the Eucharist that allows us to be in communion with the God of love whose identity is relationship. It is the Eucharist that unites us with each other in such a way that we see the other as Christ. It is the Eucharist that is the greatest gift given to us by God. It was not good enough for Jesus to be born among us, teach us, perform miracles, suffer, die and rise for us. He desired to go above and beyond in communicating his love for us by giving us the ability to truly encounter him, face-to-face, each time we receive the Eucharist. Responding to and rejoicing in this beautiful gift will only make us more aware of all the other great gifts we have received.

EUCHARISTIC ADORATION IN THE EARLY CHURCH

Eucharistic Adoration is one of the richest sources of graces for souls.

In the first ages of the Church, as Justin, Tertullian and other spiritual writers relate, the faithful were permitted to take the Sacred Hosts with them to their homes, so that if captured for martvrdom, they might yet communicate. Even on their journeys these faithful Christians did not wish to be separated from their Lord, and for this reason they carried the Holy Eucharist with them, so that, although far from a priest or church, they could still venerate the Blessed Sacrament. Interesting anecdotes could be mentioned of the hermits who took the Holy Eucharist with them into the desert. And nowadays, alas, so many Christians who live near the church do not find a moment's time to pay a visit to their Lord! But they have plenty of leisure for worldly visits. for conversations or harmful reading.

To them apply the words which St. John Chrysostom addressed to his people, "What excuse shall we have, or how shall we obtain pardon, if we consider it too much to go to Jesus, who descended from Heaven for our sake? Those foreign pagan kings hastened thither from Persia to see Him who lay in the manger; and thou, O Christian, canst thou not spare a few moments to enjoy this heavenly spectacle?"

How we shall regret our negligence at the hour of death! How we shall wish that we had oftener

visited our Judge who dwells in the Blessed Sacrament!

9 TIMES PEACE FROM POPE LEO XIV

He was emotional. His first words were: "Peace be with you." We don't know what Pope Leo XIV will ultimately be remembered for, but this is how he began standing on the balcony overlooking St. Peter's Square.

Leo explained his reasoning for choosing these as his first words. These are also the first words of Jesus to his disciples in the Upper Room on the evening of that first Easter Sunday. This is the peace of the Risen Christ, a disarming and humble and preserving peace. It comes from God. God, who loves all of us, without any limits or conditions.

Throughouthis words, he <u>said</u> the word "peace" nine times.

Through our own sin and simply through the sufferings of the human condition, we are in need of the peace of Christ. Leo XIV's insight into the human condition is inspiring. His opening words as pontiff could have centered on anything. However, he desired to transmit that Jesus truly and continuously offers us the peace (the total well-being that only God can give) that we need.

As we continue to learn more about our new Pope, we can expect to see more care for humanity and more explicit focus on the Person of Jesus Christ. His opening words were just the beginning. To all those who are hurting, Leo XIV desires you to know that you are not alone — Jesus is with you.
